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What Is Tramadol?

Tramadol is a **prescription pain medication** used to treat **moderate to moderately severe pain**.

It is classified as a **synthetic opioid analgesic**, meaning it works like an opioid but is chemically made.

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How Tramadol Works in the Body

Tramadol reduces pain in **two major ways**:

1. Opioid Receptor Action

- It attaches to **mu-opioid receptors** in the brain.

- Swallow tablets **whole** (do not crush or chew, especially ER tablets).

Dosage Forms

- **Immediate-release (IR)** tablets
 - **Extended-release (ER)** tablets (for long-term pain control)
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Side Effects of Tramadol

Common Side Effects

- Dizziness
- Drowsiness
- Nausea or vomiting
- Headache
- Constipation
- Dry mouth

Serious Side Effects

- **Dependence or addiction risk**
- **Serotonin syndrome** (if taken with certain medicines)
- **Seizures** (especially at high doses)

Seek medical help immediately if you notice difficulty breathing or severe allergic reactions.

Dependence & Misuse Warning

- Tramadol can be **habit-forming** if misused.
- Taking higher doses or using it without prescription increases risk.

- Long-term use may require a **gradual taper** to avoid withdrawal symptoms.
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Who Should Avoid Tramadol?

People should **not** take Tramadol if they have:

- **Severe asthma or breathing problems**
- **History of seizures**
- **Allergy to opioid medicines**
- **Severe liver or kidney disease**

Also, avoid Tramadol if taking:

- **MAO inhibitors**
 - **Strong antidepressants**
 - **Other opioids**
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Is Tramadol the Same as Regular Painkillers?

No.

Tramadol is **stronger than normal painkillers** (like paracetamol or ibuprofen) but **weaker than strong opioids** like morphine or oxycodone.

It works differently because it affects both opioid receptors and brain chemicals.
